## Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

#### Statement of intent

Our vision is to "Live generously and graciously towards others, the way God lives towards us" (Matthew 5:48). We nurture supportive relationships within our often-changing community. We aspire for our children to be resilient and to flourish happily, confidently and with enthusiasm.

We aim for all pupils, from every background, including children from service families with high mobility, to fulfil our vision. We aspire for all children to make excellent progress and reach their full potential across the curriculum. The focus of our pupil premium strategy is to support disadvantaged and vulnerable pupils to achieve well irrespective of their starting point.

We will consider the challenges faced by vulnerable pupils, such as those who have a social worker and young carers. The activity we have outlined in this statement is also intended to support their needs, regardless of whether they are disadvantaged or not.

High-quality teaching is at the heart of our approach, with a focus on areas in which disadvantaged pupils require the most support. This is proven to have the greatest impact on closing the disadvantage attainment gap and at the same time will benefit the non-disadvantaged pupils in our school. Implicit in the intended outcomes detailed below, is the intention that non-disadvantaged pupils' attainment will be sustained and improved alongside progress for their disadvantaged peers.

We provide high levels of pastoral care to support the emotional and mental wellbeing of our children, to overcome the additional challenges faced by children who experience high levels of mobility.

Our strategy is also integral to wider school plans for education recovery, notably in its targeted support through the National Tutoring Programme for pupils whose education has been worst affected, including non-disadvantaged pupils.

Provision will be made through:

- Facilitating pupils' access to education
- Facilitating pupils' access to the curriculum
- Alternative support and intervention within the school

### **Challenges**

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	Assessments, observations, and discussions with pupils indicate under- developed oral language skills and vocabulary gaps among many disad- vantaged pupils. These are evident from Reception through to KS2. Poor communication skills are acting as a barrier to progress.
2	Assessments, observations, and discussions with pupils suggest disadvantaged pupils generally have greater difficulties with phonics and early reading than their peers. This negatively impacts their development as readers.
3	Internal assessments indicate that progress in maths for pupils eligible for Pupil Premium is below that of their peers.
	One of the reasons for this is related to pupils' attitude and confidence. To build resilience as well as a better understanding of how they learn best are implemented through our whole school metacognitive strategy.
4	Our wellbeing surveys, observations and discussions with pupils and families have identified that social, emotional and mental health continues to have a negative impact on the progress of disadvantaged and vulnerable pupils. This has been impacted further due to a lack of enrichment opportunities and social interaction during school closure.  Teacher referrals for support have markedly increased following the pandemic.
5	Our attendance data over the last 3 years indicates that attendance among disadvantaged and vulnerable pupils has been lower than for non-disadvantaged pupils.
	Our assessments and observations indicate that absenteeism is negatively impacting pupils' progress.

### **Intended outcomes**

This explains the outcomes we are aiming for **by the end of our current strategy plan**, and how we will measure whether they have been achieved.

## Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

### **Pupil premium strategy outcomes**

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2022/2023 academic year.

Small group interventions and precision teaching were used to support children with gaps in knowledge in maths and English. We also used school led tutoring and Third Space maths, through the National Tutoring Programme, to support disadvantaged pupils in KS1 and KS2, as well as other children who were off track and had similar gaps in their learning.

We used pupil premium funding to provide wellbeing support for pupils, and targeted interventions where required. We trained staff as Emotion Coaches, one member of staff to deliver Emotional First Aid and restarted our lunchtime pastoral Hipswell Heroes Club for vulnerable pupils. These, alongside the Service Pupil Champion helped to provide much needed emotional support for children. We work closely with Early Help and the Army Welfare Service to provide additional support to families as needed.

As part of the PP review of children's progress, attendance groups were monitored weekly with interventions as necessary. Attendance data significantly improved for Pupil Premium and Service Pupil Premium.

All pupils: 94.4%

Disadvantaged PP: 92.7%

SPP: 94.3%

Subject Leader training and development through the National College, Swaledale Alliance and diocese (ESP online) have enabled staff to access the latest educational thinking and developed leadership across the school.

End of KS1 assessments for reading, writing and maths combined showed that the attainment gap is closing:

- All pupils 52%
- Non-pupil premium 67% (only 3 pupils in the cohort are non PP. 33% is one pupil.)
- Service pupil premium 50%
- Disadvantaged pupil premium 50%

End of KS2 assessments for reading, writing and maths combined showed that:

- All pupils 44%
- Non-pupil premium 38%
- Service pupil premium 41%
- Disadvantaged pupil premium 57%

Year 1 Phonics Screening Check:

- All pupils 80%
- Non-pupil premium 67%
- Service pupil premium 82%
- Disadvantaged pupil premium 100%

Year 2 Phonics Screening Check retake:

- Service pupil premium 100%
- Disadvantaged pupil premium 100%

All PP pupils who required support for school trips or clubs were supported by the school to ensure all children were able to access extracurricular enrichment.

Measure	Details
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How did you spend your service pupil premium allocation last academic year?	All staff fully engaged in training and development through the Garrison ASSIST Project which aims to improve outcomes for service pupils.  We increased the hours of Teaching Assistants to support the emotional wellbeing and academic achievement of service children. They led Hipswell Heroes lunchtime clubs to develop strategies and approaches for our service children, to stay connected to their deployed parent. We identified gaps in service children's education caused by moving between schools which we addressed with targeted support.  Additional hours allocated to a mobility coordinator to provide a seamless transition upon joining and leaving
	Hipswell.  We purchased a subscription to GL Assessment which allows us to quickly assess pupils and identify gaps as they arrive at Hipswell.
	We have an Emotional First Aider and access the Service Pupil Champion who provide additional support to pupils as needed.
What was the impact of that spending on service pupil premium eligible pupils?	Teachers and parents observed improvements in wellbeing amongst service children.
	See positive progress data above. Service children noticeably settle into Hipswell very quickly.

## **Further information (optional)**

Our pupil premium strategy will be supplemented by additional activity that is not being funded by pupil premium or recovery premium. That will include:

- embedding more effective practice around feedback. <u>EEF evidence</u> demonstrates this has significant benefits for pupils, particularly disadvantaged pupils.
- offering a wide range of high-quality extracurricular activities to boost wellbeing, behaviour, attendance, and aspiration. Activities will focus on building life skills such as confidence, resilience, and socialising. Disadvantaged pupils will be encouraged and supported to participate.

In planning our new pupil premium strategy, we evaluated why activity undertaken in previous years had not had the degree of impact that we had expected.

We triangulated evidence from multiple sources of data including assessments, engagement in class book scrutiny, conversations with parents, students and teachers in order to identify the challenges faced by disadvantaged pupils.
